## Ayşe Erzan (Turkey)



- Theoretical physicist from Istanbul Technical University (retired).
- Field: Biological networks.
- Currently being tried in Turkey for "propagandizing for a terrorist organization".

- July 2015: PKK rebellion.
- January 10, 2016: As an act of protest *Academics For Peace* circulated a petition: "We will not be a party to this crime" (signed by 2212 academics).
- As of June 26, 2018, 256 of the signatories have had a court hearing. 16 of these have been condemned to one year and three months in prison (the sentences were deferred in all but two cases).

### Serkan Gölge (Turkey)



- Research scientist at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.
- Condemned to 7.5 years in prison.

- July 15, 2016: Attempted coup d'etat.
- Blamed on the followers of Fethullah Güllen.
- The Turkish government has dismissed over 100 000 people, and arrested over 50 000.



- The arrests often seem arbitrary
  - ▶ some were arrested for using a secure messaging app,
  - ▶ the Altan brothers were arrested for [giving] subliminal messages suggesting a military coup on television,
  - ► Gölge, according to his wife, was denounced as a Güllen supporter by a relative with whom he was involved in an inheritance dispute.
- In many cases, dismissed scholars (and, more generally, people) cannot find new work, and are barred from travel.

## Ahmadreza Djalali (Iran)



- Medical researcher, specializing in disaster medicine.
- A resident of Sweden, he was arrested in April 2016 while organizing a workshop in Tehran.
- He is accused of "corruption on Earth" and spying, and was sentenced to death in October 2017.

## Ahmadreza Djalali (Iran)

- He was held in solitary confinment for three months, and forced to sign confessions.
- In a letter written from his prison cell in August 2017, Djalali claimed that, in 2014, the Iranian government had asked him to spy on their behalf in the European institutions to which he was affiliated. He claimed that his arrest was a reprisal for his refusal.
- His appeals were rejected, and he is currently awaiting his execution in Evin prison.

### Santiago Guevara (Venezuela)



- Economist from the University of Carabobo.
- He studied the Venezuelan economy, and came to conclusions which were critical of Chavez' economic policy.
- Arrested on February 23, 2017 and released on December 23, 2017.

- Raúl Baduel: ex-general who was close to Chavez. He fell out of favor in 2008 and was sentenced to 8 years in prison.
- Guevara was the thesis advisor for Baduel's son, and became close to the ex-general (who was, himself, critical of "Castrocomunism").
- On January 10, 2017, shortly before his release, Baduel was accused of fomenting a coup against Maduro and kept in prison.
- Guevara was arrested on February 23 for "treason".
- He was released on December 23, having lost 28 kg.

### Omid Kokabee (Iran)



- PhD student at the University of Texas, specializing in laser physics.
- Arrested in January 2011 while visiting his family in Iran, sentenced on May 13, 2012 to 10 years for "cooperation with a hostile government".
- Released on parole on August 29, 2016.

- Kokabee explains, in a letter written from Evin prison, that he had been repeatedly approached by Iranian government officials to participate in military projects, including the Nuclear Project. He systematically refused.
- In prison, we was offered his freedom in exchange for his participation in military projects. Again, he refused.
- He was released on parole in 2016 after receiving treatment for a kidney cancer, contracted in prison.
- His parole could be reversed at any time.

#### Scholar Rescue Fund



• Awards fellowships to at-risk Scholars. They are 1 to 2 years long. SRF provides up to \$25000 a year, and requires a matching donation from the host institution.

- Run by the Institute of International Education, founded in 1919.
- Its first success was to lobby the US government to create a non-immigrant student visa that would bypass the stringent quotas imposed in 1921.
- In 1933, it founded the Emergency Committee in Aid of Displaced German Scholars, which brought 330 European scholars to the USA, among which Felix Bloch, Richard Courant, James Franck, Emmy Noether and many others.
- The SRF was founded in 2002.

#### Scholar Rescue Fund

- So far, 1194 awards have been granted to 761 scholars.
- 2007-2014: Iraq Scholar Rescue Project. Helped 280 scholars. 40% have returned to Iraq.
- Syria: 101 scholars since 2011.
