## Ayşe Erzan (Turkey)



- Theoretical physicist from Istanbul Technical University (retired).
- Former editor of the Journal of Statistical Physics.
- Currently being tried in Turkey for "propagandizing for a terrorist organization".

### Turkey - Peace Petition

- July 2015: PKK rebellion.
- January 10, 2016: As an act of protest *Academics For Peace* circulated a petition: "We will not be a party to this crime" (signed by 2212 academics).
- As of December 17, 2018, 429 of the signatories have had a court hearing. 62 of these have been sentenced to prison sentences exceeding one year and three months (the sentences were suspended in all but 7 cases).
- Erzan was sentenced on December 12 to 1 year 3 months in prison. Her sentence was not suspended: "on the ground that there has formed no conviction that the defendants will abstain from committing offence considering their personalities showing no remorse."

## Serkan Gölge (Turkey)



- Research scientist at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.
- Condemned to 7.5 years in prison, reduced to 5 years.

## Turkey - Purge

- July 15, 2016: Attempted coup d'etat.
- Blamed on the followers of Fethullah Güllen.
- The Turkish government has dismissed over 100 000 people, and arrested over 50 000.



### Turkey - Purge

- The arrests often seem arbitrary
  - ▶ some were arrested for using a secure messaging app,
  - ▶ the Altan brothers were arrested for [giving] subliminal messages suggesting a military coup on television,
  - ► Gölge, according to his wife, was denounced as a Güllen supporter by a relative with whom he was involved in an inheritance dispute.
- In many cases, dismissed scholars (and, more generally, people) cannot find new work, and are barred from travel.

#### Many more cases

- Ahmadreza Djalali (Iran): sentenced to death.
- Xiyue Wang (Iran): sentenced to 10 years in prison.
- Aziza al-Yousef, Eman al-Nafjan, Hatoon al-Fassi (Saudi Arabia): imprisoned and tortured.
- Muhammad Salih Hajim (China, Uyghur): died in custody.
















#### Scholar Rescue Fund



• Awards fellowships to at-risk Scholars. They are 1 to 2 years long. SRF provides up to \$25 000 a year, and requires a matching donation from the host institution.

### Scholar Rescue Fund - history

- Run by the Institute of International Education, founded in 1919.
- Its first success was to lobby the US government to create a non-immigrant student visa that would bypass the stringent quotas imposed in 1921.
- In 1933, it founded the Emergency Committee in Aid of Displaced German Scholars, which brought 330 European scholars to the USA, among which Felix Bloch, Richard Courant, James Franck, Emmy Noether and many others.
- The SRF was founded in 2002.

#### Scholar Rescue Fund

- So far, 1228 awards have been granted to 777 scholars.
- 2007-2014: Iraq Scholar Rescue Project. Helped 280 scholars. 40% have returned to Iraq.
- Syria: 103 scholars since 2011.
