- Abdul Jalil Al-Singace (Bahrain), Mechanical egineer, jailed since 2011 for pro-democracy and human rights activism. Life imprisonment.<sup>[1]</sup>
- Ilham Tohti (China), Economist, jailed since 2014, sentenced to life imprisonment for "splitting the state". [2]
- Nasser bin Ghaith (United Arab Emirates), Economist, jailed since 2015 for criticizing Egypt's human rights record. Sentenced to 10 years in 2017, and life in 2024. [3]







- Ahmadrezza Djalali (Iran), Medical researcher, jailed since 2016, on death row, for refusing to cooperate with Iranian intelligence. [4]
- Narges Mohammadi (Iran), Engineer, jailed since 2021 (in addition to earlier periods) for her human rights activism.<sup>[5]</sup>
- Rahile Dawut (China), Ethnographer, jailed since 2017, secretly sentenced to life in prison. Only acknowledged publicly in 2023. [6]







- Russia: Researchers on hypersonic flight<sup>[7]</sup>
  - ▶ In Prison: Anatoly Maslov  $(2022-)^{[8]}$ , Alexandr Shiplyuk  $(2022-)^{[8]}$ , Alexandr Kuranov  $(2021-)^{[9]}$ , Anatoly Gubanov  $(2020-)^{[10]}$ , Valery Golubkin  $(2021-)^{[11]}$
  - ► Awaiting trial: Vladislav Galkin (2023-)<sup>[7]</sup>,
  - ▶ Died in custody: Viktor Kudryavtsev (2018-2021)<sup>[12]</sup>, Dmitry Kolker (2022)<sup>[7]</sup>, Roman Kovalyov (2018-2022)<sup>[13]</sup>
  - ▶ Released: Vladimir Lapygin  $(2016-2020)^{[14]}$
  - ► House arrest: Valery Zvegintsev (2022-)<sup>[8]</sup>







- China: Chinese professors working in Japan
  - ► Fan Yuntao<sup>[15]</sup>, Political Scientist, disappeared in 2024.
  - ▶ Hu Shiyun<sup>[16]</sup>, Language teacher, disappeared in 2023.
  - ► Yuan Keqin<sup>[17]</sup> Political Scientist sentenced to 6 years in 2020 on espionage charges.

### Governments controlling academic activity

- China: Comprehensive push to enforce an ideological bias in universities. [18]: "Patriotic Education Law" [19], enforcing the policies of the CCCP at the Chinese Academy of Science. [20]
- USA: Restriction of DEI offices<sup>[20]</sup>, and control of classroom speech, such as the StopWOKE act in Florida.<sup>[20]</sup>
- Nicaragua: government closed 9 universities between 2018 and 2023.<sup>[21]</sup> A new law was passed restricting university 's control over curricula, hiring and firing of personnel.<sup>[20]</sup>
- Canada: Restricting scientific collaboration in certain fields with China, Iran, and Russia<sup>[20]</sup>, and imposing restrictions on admissions of foreign students<sup>[22]</sup>

### Scholars caught up in political upheaval

- Israeli-Palestinian conflict ( $\geq$  96 professors killed<sup>[23][24]</sup>, 12 universities damaged or destroyed<sup>[25]</sup>).
- Sudanese civil war.
- Taliban takeover of Afghanistan.
- Russian invasion of Ukraine ( $\geq 9$  universities destroyed, 59 damaged<sup>[26]</sup>).
- February 2021 coup in Myanmar, followed by repression and arrests.
- Mass incarceration of Uyghurs in Xinjiang, China starting in 2017.
- Failed 2015 coup in Türkiye (firings, arrests and travel bans en masse).
- Yemen civil war.

#### Scholar Rescue Fund





- Awards fellowships to at-risk Scholars. They are 1 to 2 years long. SRF provides up to \$25 000 a year, and requires a matching donation from the host institution.
- So far, 1,884 awards have been granted to 1,134 scholars.
